

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

Be it resolved by the Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe in regular session this date December 1, 1941 that:

WHEREAS, it is the practice of those of our stock associations which move their cattle to high mountain ranges to hire Indian range riders to look after the cattle while on these summer pastures, and

WHEREAS, these range riders must, at present, live in poorly made tents during the entire rainy season when it is common for rain storms to occur as often as two or three times a week, and

WHEREAS, the discomfort and exposure to which these members of our tribe are subjected for weeks at a time are likely to cause serious illness, and

WHEREAS, many of our grazing districts now have too few or poorly located storehouses for the storage of stock salt, horse feed and roundup supplies which makes it both difficult and costly to pack out these supplies over the range, now, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Interior be requested to approve the expenditure of \$4,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary from individual Indian Money - White Mountain Apache Tribal Account for the construction of approximately ten (10) summer camp houses and twelve (12) salt houses to be located most advantageously over the various grazing districts.

The foregoing resolution was on December 1, 1941 duly adopted by a vote of 8 for and 0 against, by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article VI, Section 1 (d) & (e) of the Constitution and By-laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe on August 15, 1938 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on August 26, 1938 pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
