

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the Assembly of God Church is occupying lands at Whiteriver that are owned by the tribe, equal in size to six lots but irregular in shape, and

WHEREAS, the Tribe is now providing water and other facilities for the purpose of permitting all available lots in that area to be occupied by Indians, and

WHEREAS, the Assembly of God Church is making use of only a part of the land it occupies, that is an area equal to about two lots, and

WHEREAS, the two irregular lots actually occupied by the Church and some of the structures of the Church now obstruct the completion of a partially constructed street of the development

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the government and the Church are requested (a) to return to tribal possession the tract equivalent to four lots now occupied but not used by the Church (b) to remove the structures that now obstruct the completion of the street, and (c) to alter the boundaries of the land remaining in the possession of the Church to conform to the subdivision;

Provided however that the boundaries of said remaining lots may be adjusted temporarily in such a way as to permit the church to remain where it is and to permit the proposed street temporarily to curve around it instead of running directly as now planned

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Tribal Attorneys shall assist the Chairman in carrying this resolution into effect.

The foregoing Resolution was on the 11th day of September, 1951 duly adopted by a vote of _____ for and _____ against, by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe pursuant to authority vested in it by Article VI, Section 1 (c) of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe on August 15, 1938 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on August 26, 1938 pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
