

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, in 1948 the Southwest Lumber Company obtained permission to clear a strip of tribal timber land near Maverick for the purpose of constructing a landing field for aircraft and subsequent to clearing the strips of timber decided to abandon the undertaking, and

WHEREAS, although the company paid under its contract for all commercial timber removed, this resulted in a loss to the tribe's future income through removal of the reserve stand of timber and reproduction on 163 acres, and

WHEREAS, through negotiation between the Council and representatives of the company a compromise figure of six thousand one hundred twelve dollars and fifty-cents (\$6,112.50) was agreed upon as a fair value of the loss to the Tribe, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that the sum of six thousand one hundred twelve dollars and fifty-cents (\$6,112.50) be accepted as payment in full of the damages accruing to the tribe as a result of the activity described herein.

The foregoing Resolution was on November 2, 1953 duly adopted by a vote of 8 for and 0 against, by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe pursuant to authority vested in it by Article VI, Section 1 (d), (n) of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe on August 15, 1938 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on August 26, 1938 pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
