## RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, the tribe is engaged in a tremendously successful program of industrial and commercial recreational development, and
- WHEREAS, these developments are absolutely essential to the growth and wellbeing of the tribe, and
- WHEREAS, the federal government is the primary source of development capital for these tribal programs, and
- WHEREAS, the federal government is becoming increasingly aware of the need for conducting environmental pollution prevention studies in connection with government funded development programs.
- BE IT RESOLVED that the White Mountain Apache Tribal Council make application to the appropriate federal agency for grant funds to conduct an environmental pollution control and prevention study.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the scope of this study should include, but not necessarily be limited to:
  - 1. Identification of existing sources of pollution together with practical and economical recommendations for correction.
  - An analysis of possible future sources of pollution as could best be determined by the tribes long range development programs.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chairman, White Mountain Apache Tribe, be authorized to sign any and all documents required to develop this program.

The foregoing resolution was on June 3, 1970 duly adopted by a vote of 8 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (b & i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
