RESOLUTION OF THE UNHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE HUDIAN RESERVATION

- UHEREAS, in July, 1971, three wildFires known as the Carrizo Junction and Bull Flat forest fires caused damage to the soil, timber and Grazing resources on approximately 63,000 acres on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation, and
- WHEREAS, the Bureau of Indian Affairs surveyed the fire area and recommended the immediate rehabilitation of the burned areas in the following order:
 - 1. Aerial grass seeding
 - 2. Aerial photography
 - 3. Fencing of planted area where necessary to protect the seedlings
 - 4. Field planting of scedlings from nursery

and

- WHEREAS, permission to fence a planting area will be secured by the respective Livestock Association, and
- THEREAS, some of the planting area may not need to be fenced, as staking or another method may be used to protect the seedlings, and
- WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribe desires to have soil, watershed, timber and grazing resources protected and maintained.
- BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Hountain Apache Tribe of Arizona that funds be secured to accomplish this proposed rehabilitation work.

The foregoing resolution was on June 7, 1972 duly adopted by a vote of 10 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958 pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
