## RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, in Navajo, Gila and Apache counties there are in excess of 6,000 White Mountain Apache Indians, and
- WHEREAS, on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation, there are many well-trained, highly qualified police officers, and
- WHEREAS, there is not one White Mountain Apache Deputy Sheriff appointed in many of these counties, and
- WHEREAS, it would not only be helpful in combating crime both on and off the reservation if a White Mountain Apache were appointed Deputy Sheriff in each of the said counties.
- BE IT RESOLVED that the sheriffs and/or the Board of Supervisor of Gila, Apache and Navajo counties for help requested to appoint a White Mountain Apache as Deputy Sheriff in each of the said counties.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Deputy Sheriff from Gila County be stationed at Canyon Day; that the Deputy Sheriff of Apache County at McNary, Arizona; and the Deputy Sheriff of Navajo County be stationed at Whiteriver, Arizona.

The foregoing resolution was on November 1, 1972 duly adopted by a vote of 9 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (b) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
