RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the Tribal Court in Whiteriver hears many cases involving Apache people who understand little, if any English, and

WHEREAS, in such cases the Court must hear the case in the Apache language, and

WHEREAS, Court Records must be kept in English, since the Apache Language has no true written form.

BE IT RESOLVED that it is mandatory that the Clerk of the Court, in order to take accurate records, must be able to speak and interpret it into the English language immediately so that it may be recorded.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this requirement be effective as of November 1, 1972.

The foregoing resolution was on November 1, 1972 duly adopted by a vote of 9 for and 1 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
