## RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council discussed, at some length, the problem of Indian cattle migrating off of the reservation, and
- WHEREAS, these points of migration are on the major highways at their intersection with the reservation boundary, and
- WHEREAS, Highway 60 on the reservation boundary below Show Low and Highway 173 between Indian Pine and Pinetop are the major areas of migration, and
- WHEREAS, the cattle being on the major highways and in the adjacent areas to the reservation creates a public hazard, and
- WHEREAS, this problem was not so apparent and the hazard not so great when there were cattleguards on the State and Federal Highways.
- BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that they hereby request the Department of Public Safety of the State of Arizona to reconstruct the cattleguards on Highway 60 and Highway 173 at their intersection with the reservation boundary.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this request is made in the interest of the safety of the general public and visitors to the White Mountain areas as well as in the interest of the livestock owners of the Fort Apache Indian Reservation whose livelihood depends upon livestock production.

The foregoing resolution was on April 9, 1975 duly adopted by a vote of 8 for and O against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (b), (i) and (f) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
