

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the Fish and Wildlife on Indian lands have been controversial, and

WHEREAS, since time immemorial, the Indian Tribes claim ownership to all reservation resources, and

WHEREAS, Fish and wildlife is considered by this tribe to be an important resource, and

WHEREAS, it is the desires of this Tribal Council to control and regulate the fish and wildlife resource with all other resources.


BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that this Governing Body strongly supports Senator Abourek's Senate Bill 1328 that gives full authority to each reservation governing body to control the fish and wildlife resources.


BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that it is the prayer of this Tribe that Senate Bill 1328 will pass and become law and return to the Indian Tribes this gift of nature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Tribe request that the President, Congress, the Department of the Interior, and the population of the United States totally support this legislation to settle this long standing argument and return to the Indian Reservations the total responsibility of management and ownership of the fish and wildlife resources.

The foregoing resolution was on August 7, 1975 duly adopted by a vote of 10 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (f) and (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
