RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, the tribal members of the White Mountain Apache Tribe collectively owns the Apache Flame, and authorize the Tribal Council to be responsible for its proper operation in the best interests of the people, and
- WHEREAS, the Apache Flame was specifically created for the purpose of the use and enjoyment of all tribal members, and
- WHEREAS, a great many tribal members have expressed to members of the Tribal Council their common concern over the inhibitive and socially disadvantageous effects of requiring a cover charge upon entering the Apache Flame, and
- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council finds that the required cover charge detrimentally affects the ability of tribal members to exercise their rights to the use and enjoyment of such facility.
- BE IT RESOLVED that the Tribal Council hereby acknowledges its responsibilities to the members of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, including their rights to the reasonable use and enjoyment of the Apache Flame, as tribal property, and therefore declares that no cover charge shall hereafter be required of any patrons of the Apache Flame.

The foregoing resolution was on February 11, 1976 duly adopted by a vote of 6 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
