

RESOLUTION OF THE  
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE  
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the U. S. Geological Survey has requested permission to install a stream-flow gaging station on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation to replace the present gaging station on Carrizo Creek at the old U. S. 60 Highway Bridge, and since this station will become inoperable when the old bridge is removed, and the new bridge is not suitable for reinstallation of the present equipment, with the proposed new station location being on the right bank of Carrizo Creek about 300 feet upstream from the bridge; consisting of a small gage house (about 5' x 5' x 7' high) on the right bank of the stream above the high-water level, and with a pipe conduit (about 2' in diameter) extending along or under the ground from the gage house to the low point in the stream channel, and

WHEREAS, the installation will not interfere with the flow of the stream, will be serviced and maintained regularly by employees of the U. S. Geological Survey and all streamflow data collected therefore will be furnished to the White Mountain Apache Tribe if desired, and

WHEREAS, prompt replacement of this installation is needed to maintain continuity of record of the flow in Carrizo Creek.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that permission be given to the U. S. Geological Survey to install and operate this gaging station, including ingress and egress to service, evaluate and maintain the station.

The foregoing resolution was on August 11, 1976 duly adopted by a vote of 9 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
