RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, the Salt Banks on the Salt River are of great religious and historical significance to the White Mountain Apache people, and;
- WHEREAS, historically, the Salt Banks were used by many tribes in the past as a source of salt for their use, and;
- WHEREAS, the Salt Banks are of great historical significance to all of the State of Arizona.
- BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache
 Tribe that the Salt Banks be preserved for their religious
 and historical significance for enjoyment of future generation
 and nominated to the register of historic sites.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that an area not to exceed sixty (60) acres be designated for a historical site.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Tribal Chairman be authorized and directed to sign any and all documents required for the submission of the historical nomination.

The foregoing resolution was on August 3, 1977, duly adopted by a vote of 9 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934, (48 Stat. 984).
