RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribe is committed to a sound future for its youth, and
- WHEREAS, the continuous abuse of toxic inhalents and other substances is endangering the health and well-being of said youth, and
- WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribe recognizes that limits on the availability of toxic inhalents and other substances to youth is an important part of preventing abuse.
- BE IT RESOLVED that the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe directs that a Tribal Ordinance or policy be implemented and enforced that would:
 - 1. Limit the sale of paint solvents, spray paints, solvent glues and tobacco products to persons over eighteen (18) years of age.
 - 2. Prohibit gasoline sales to persons under the age of eighteen (18) years of age in containers other than motor vehicle gas tanks.
 - 3. Mandate that businesses on the Reservation selling paint solvents, spray paints, solvent glues and tobacco products place such products behind counters, in locked display cases or to make them otherwise inaccessible to persons under the age of eighteen (18) years of age.
 - 4. Mandate that Ribal and non-tribal governmental agencies on the Reservation place locking gas caps on agency vehicles.
 - 5. Mandate that construction companis on the Reservation destroy or remove all paint solvents, spray paints and other toxic substance containers at construction sites when no longer in use.

The foregoing resolution was on June 04, 1980 duly adopted by a vote of 10 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984)
