

RESOLUTION OF THE  
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE  
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council has been presented with a study prepared by Indian Health Service personnel from the Whiteriver Service Unit regarding roadway and roadside hazards on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation; and
- WHEREAS, the study indicates an alarming number and frequency of motor vehicle accidents involving pedestrians and animals, the majority of which are livestock; and
- WHEREAS, Indian Health Service personnel from the IHS Whiteriver Hospital Unit have advised the Tribal Council that there may be funding available from IHS for a program to prevent motor vehicle accidents involving pedestrians and animals; and
- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council unanimously supports the fine efforts of the IHS Whiteriver Service Unit to apply for said funding for this very necessary accident prevention program.


BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby supports a proposal submitted by the IHS Whiteriver Service Unit to apply for IHS funding for a motor vehicle accident prevention program in order to reduce as much as possible the number and frequency of motor vehicle accidents involving pedestrians and livestock on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation.


The foregoing resolution was on July 9, 1987, duly adopted by a vote of ELEVEN for and ZERO against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and Bylaws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
