

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribe recognizes its most precious cultural resource is the Elders of the Fort Apache Indian Reservation; and

WHEREAS, the Custodial Care Group Home Services are presently a subcomponent of the Department of Social Services for the less than skilled level of care clientele and should be separated financially from the Department of Social Services to provide for increased accuracy in monitoring the non-banded funding provided by BIA in the adult institutional category; and

WHEREAS, the Social Services Department recognizes the need for separation of the Group Home from the Social Services Department on a financial basis for funding purposes in order that a 24-hour operated facility for the Apache Elderly can be provided.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby separates on a financial basis the Custodial Care Group Home Services to the Elderly from the Department of Social Services for the purpose of accurate monitoring of the non-banded funds allocated and continued functioning of a 24-hour facility for the Apache Elderly.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the authority to contract this program granted in Resolution 63-89-85 is unaffected by the present action and continues for the period May 1, 1989 through April 30, 1992.

The foregoing resolution was on May 4, 1989, duly adopted by a vote of NINE for and ZERO against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (a) and (b) of the Amended Constitution and Bylaws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
