CRITERIA FOR A PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT STRATEGY

- 1. Protection of Tribal sovereignty, Tribal human resources, Tribal natural resources, and the quality of the environment on the reservation are paramount objectives in the development of any economic project. Maintenance of the Federal Trust responsibility is of major importance to these objectives. Improvement of the quality of life and the environment on the reservation is also paramount.
- 2. Bettering Tribal cash flow is vital. Fundamental means of doing so are related to improved efficiency and management of existing enterprises, development of new enterprises based on the resources available and aggressive grantsmanship.
- 3. Expansion of existing successful Tribal enterprises to their practicable limits may create more income and more jobs in less time and with less money investment. Curtailing unsuccessful enterprises, or improving their efficiency is just as important.
- 4. Development of new commercial, industrial and recreational sources of revenue is another means of creating jobs for the increasing labor force. This must be done consistant with Tribal goals and values, including the maintenance of environmental quality.
- 5. The reservation generates much business for nearby communties. Opportunities to stop this business leakage by better serving the needs which have been developed may be another source of new business development. In this connection, it must be kept in mind that the facilities which are already in place outside the reservation will compete strenuously to keep the available business.
- 6. For economic development projects, grant funds or other resources should be used as much as possible and Tribal funds should be used as a last resort and reserved as much as possible.
- 7. Vertical integration of established enterprises should be considered wherever practicable and where resources are available to do so at little cost.
- 8. Development of small resource based manufactories or cottage industries should be considered as low cost ways of putting people to work in remote communities without investing or risking large sums of money.
