## RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, Cedar Creek has caused erosion of land immediately surrounding the home of Nancy Armstrong and has caused portions of her back yard to wash away in the creek; and
- WHEREAS, the erosion along Cedar Creek behind the home of Nancy Armstrong is beginning to endanger her home and property due to the location of her propane gas tank at the rear of her house, near the creek; and
- WHEREAS, erosion is also occuring along the White River below Canyon Day and such erosion has claimed some of the farm land which has been assigned to Larry Massey in Canyon Day and such land lies across the river from the rock crusher.
- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council believes that the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Fort Apache Agency Land Operations Office can make arrangements to stop and/or curtail the continual erosion along Cedar Creek and the Whiteriver River below Canyon Day.
- BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache
  Tribe that the Land Operations Office of the Fort Apache
  Agency is hereby directed to make efforts to curtail
  and/or stop the erosion along the Cedar Creek behind
  Nancy Armstrong's home and along the White River along
  Larry Massey's farmland in Canyon Day across from the
  rock crusher.

The foregoing resolution was on <u>January 8, 1992</u>, duly adopted by a vote of <u>SIX</u> for and <u>ZERO</u> against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and Bylaws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
