RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, the people of the White Mountain Apache Tribe mourn the passing away of Josiah Moore, April 19, 1993, Chairman of the Tohono O'odham Nation and an outstanding champion of Native American rights, education and sovereignty; and
- Josiah Moore's lifetime devotion to the advancement of WHEREAS, the people of the Tohono O'odham Nation, of Native Americans in Arizona and throughout the United States, has immeasurably contributed to the betterment of Native Americans; and
- WHEREAS, the people of the White Mountain Apache Tribe wish to acknowledge Chairman Moore's contributions and to extend their deepest sympathies to the Tohono O'odham people.
- BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that on behalf of the people of the White Mountain Apache Tribe it hereby expresses its deepest sympathy to the family of Josiah Moore and the people of the Tohono O'odham Nation.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council that Josiah Moore's leadership, spirituality, devotion to higher education for Native Americans and resolute defense of the tribal sovereignty of the Tohono O'odham Nation and all Native Americans is deeply appreciated and will be remembered always.

The foregoing resolution was on April 21, 1993, duly adopted by a vote of six for and zero against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and Bylaws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
