**RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION**

WHEREAS, the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe has adopted the Fort Apache Master Plan and has endorsed previous applications in support in historic preservation projects addressing Crook's Cabin, the Fort Apache Stables, and Kinishba; and

WHEREAS, previous economic and community development initiatives associated with historic preservation projects have focused exclusively on the Whiteriver area; and

WHEREAS, the architecturally unique and historically significant adobe Mission Church located in lower Cibecue is on the verge of irreversible deterioration; and

WHEREAS, Cibecue Community leaders and the District Council Members have voiced their support for and commitment to the rehabilitation of the Mission for use as a culture center and museum to serve the Cibecue area as a part of the Tribe's Heritage Program and Fort Apache Park development; and

WHEREAS, the Arizona State Historic Preservation Office has invited the Tribe to apply for grants; and


WHEREAS, the cost of the Mission Rehabilitation Project and preparation for use as an adjunct Culture center is estimated at \$58, 285; and

WHEREAS, the Tribe is required to provide fifty percent (50%) of the project cost in-kind or in cash.


BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby authorizes that a grant application be prepared for SHPO funding and that, if this application is successful, the required match be provided with in-kind support from existing programs.

The foregoing resolution was on June 27, 1996 duly adopted by a vote of nine for and zero against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by the White Mountain Apache Tribe Constitution, including Article IV, Section 1 (a), (g), (i), (j) and (k) of the Constitution of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe September 30, 1993, and approved by the Secretary of Interior on November 12, 1993, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).

Signatures of the members of the Tribal Council represent their approval of Tribal Resolution


As you are no doubt aware the White Mountain Apache Tribe has, in the last four years and with your welcome assistance, launched a major initiative to take responsibility for historic preservation on the Fort Apache Reservation and to integrate historic preservation with community and economic development efforts. The foundation for this initiative is the Fort Apache Master Plan, which is well into the implementation stage with work in progress on several buildings at the Fort and plans being prepared for stabilization at Kinishba Ruins National Historical Landmark.

While we are pleased to see this progress at Fort Apache, as the District I representatives to the Tribal Council, we are eager to see attention given to the distinctive and equally important heritage of the reservation's West End. In an effort to rescue an acutely endangered historic building and to expand the scope of the Tribe's Heritage Program, the White Mountain Apache Tribe seeks funding to rehabilitate the Cibecue Lutheran Mission Church as a culture center and museum. The required architectural preservation treatments are to be supervised by a National Park Service subject specialist and will involve repair or replacement of roof, wall, floor, door, window, and ceiling elements. All work (planning, documentation, and treatments) will be completed in accord with the Secretary's Standards and Guidelines.
