## RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council adopted Resolution No. 03-95-184 on March 1, 1995 wherein it resolved to appropriate One Million Dollars to be used in conjunction with approximately Five Million Dollars of Whiteriver School District funding for the construction of a gymnasium and activity center for school district and tribally sponsored activities to be known as the Chief Alchesay Activity Center; and
- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council appropriated the One Million Dollars, without which the Alchesay Activity Center could not have been built, in reliance upon representations made to the Council by Superintendent John Clark and members of the School Board that, although the Activity Center would be a school district facility, it would be available to the Tribe for community events, such as concerts and plays; and
- WHEREAS, Superintendent John Clark of the Whiteriver Unified School District has been quoted in a newspaper article as stating that, although the Center was being built by the school district primarily for school activities, it would also "serve as a place to hold community events" and further, that the same article recounts that the Tribe offered to contribute construction materials to the building, thereby enabling the district to add another level of functionality to the new building and to upgrade the facility so as to serve as an emergency shelter with lights, heat, and its own generator; and
- WHEREAS, a copy of said newspaper article with quotes from Superintendent John Clark and School Board members is attached to this resolution and incorporated by reference herein; and
- WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 03-95-084, the Tribal Chairman was to develop with the Whiteriver School District Superintendent an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) regarding the policies and procedures for usage of the Activity Center for tribal and community activities; and
- WHEREAS, subsequently, on May 15, 1995, the Tribal Chairman entered into such Agreement with the Whiteriver Unified School District and the Agreement states in part that "it would benefit the entire community to make the Whiteriver Activity Center available for community use when not required for school activities . . ." and further that the purpose of the Intergovernmental Agreement was to set basic use guidelines for the Whiteriver Activity Center; and

- WHEREAS, the IGA provides that the Superintendent will be the approval authority for all use of the facility; and
- WHEREAS, the IGA also provides that "the Tribe shall have unlimited access to the facility as long as the primary use priorities to the building for school activities are satisfied."; and
- WHEREAS, the IGA also provides that if a dispute arises regarding interpretations or implementation of the agreement, that a resolution will be attempted between the School District governing board and the Tribal Council; and
- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council, in good faith, has requested the use of the Alchesay Activity Center for this year's Tribal Fair and Rodeo for a concert on or about Sunday, September 1, 1996 at 10:00 p.m.; and
- WHEREAS, the governing board of the Whiteriver Unified School District has denied use of the Activity Center for the requested concert; and
- WHEREAS, despite repeated requests to the School Board by the Council to meet and discuss the concert issue for the benefit of the community and students, the School Board has steadfastly refused to participate in any attempt, pursuant to the IGA, to resolve said dispute; and
- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council to date has extended itself in every way possible in its attempt to reach an amicable resolution of the concert issue with the School Board and to develop appropriate guidelines for the mutual benefit of the Tribe and the School District for use of the Activity Center; and
- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council concludes that a resolution should be adopted that formally requests that Superintendent John Clark again call for a School Board meeting with the Tribal Council at a location to be agreed upon by the Council and governing board, or at a location selected by the Board, in order to comply with dispute resolution procedures set forth in the Intergovernmental Agreement.
- BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby declares that it has always acted in the utmost good faith and in reliance upon representations and promises made by Superintendent John Clark and School Board members, in public and private meetings, including the Activity Center's planning process, and in the media, that the Alchesay Activity Center would be available for tribal wide activities.

- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council that it hereby declares that in reliance upon the representations made by Superintendent John Clark and members of the governing School Board for the Whiteriver Unified School District, the Tribal Council appropriated a One Million Dollar contribution to the School District, without which the Activity Center could not have been built.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council that it is hereby exercising its rights under the Intergovernmental Agreement and requests a meeting with the School District governing board for the purpose of resolving disputes arising from the implementation of the IGA, and further, requests that Superintendent John Clark call for a School Board meeting with the Tribal Council so that there can be a good faith and earnest sharing of ideas to develop appropriate guidelines in respect to the use of the Activity Center that primarily serves the students as well as the needs of the tribal community at large.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council that it requests that this meeting be noticed for Monday, August 19, 1996 at a time convenient for all the parties, or as soon thereafter as the parties can meet and confer, but in no event later than Friday, August 23, 1996.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council that it directs the Tribal Council Secretary to hand deliver or cause to be delivered a copy of this resolution to Superintendent John Clark and members of the governing board of the Whiteriver Unified School District No. 20.

The foregoing resolution was on August 14, 1996 duly adopted by a vote of <u>nine</u> for and <u>zero</u> against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by the White Mountain Apache Tribe Constitution, including Article IV, Section 1 (a), (b), (g), (h), (i), (k), (s), (t), and (u) of the Constitution of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe September 30, 1993, and approved by the Secretary of Interior on November 12, 1993, pursuant to Section 16 of the Get of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
