

**RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION**

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution 04-87-101 the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe established a class of places of exceptional cultural and historical significance through the creation of the Lower Cibecue Lutheran Mission Church as a designated Tribal Landmark; and

WHEREAS, the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe has, through the authorization of the Tribe's Historic Preservation Office, assumed preservation functions for White Mountain Apache Tribal lands previously under the control of the Arizona State Historic Preservation Officer, including the maintenance and safeguarding of the inventory of all sites and places of cultural and historical importance on White Mountain Apache lands; and

WHEREAS, the existing Historic Preservation Office's inventory contains documentation pertaining to many places of exceptional cultural and historical significance that deserve special recognition as Tribal Landmarks.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby designates the following sites and localities as Tribal Landmarks: Dzil Ligayi (Mt. Baldy), Ishii (Salt Banks), Be ilkan dana'eel (Pumpkin Lake), Blue Lake, Kinishba Ruins National Historic Landmark, Theodore Roosevelt School / Fort Apache National Register Historic District, Whiteriver Lutheran Church and associated structures and facilities, East Fork Lutheran Mission and Mission School, Grasshopper Ruins National Register Site.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that all designated Tribal Landmarks shall be enhanced, preserved, and maintained for the highest and best uses of the N'dee people and the White Mountain Apache Tribe according to standards established by the Cultural Advisory Board and the Tribal Historic Preservation Office.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that the owners, managers, users, and residents of all Tribal Landmarks are urged to respect, protect, and preserve these properties in the name of posterity, and are to refrain from disrespectful acts towards these properties, such as vandalism, theft, demolition, and so forth.


BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that proposed alterations in the appearance or character of Tribal Landmarks or their



settings shall require, at a minimum, consultation with the White Mountain Apache Tribe Historic Preservation Officer.

The foregoing resolution was on March 6, 2002 duly adopted by a vote of SEVEN for and ZERO against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article IV, Section 1 (a), (c), (f), (g), (h), (t), and (u) of the Constitution of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe September 30, 1993, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on November 12, 1993, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
