
RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, there is a longstanding and well-documented need for medical care services to be provided outside the walls of the Indian Health Service facilities and in the homes of the WMAT people; and
- WHEREAS, there is a sincere desire of the White Mountain Apache Tribe to expand its involvement in and direction of medical care service provision for the people on the Reservation; and
- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe has authorized the Division of Health Programs (DHP) to protect and promote good health among all Tribal members; and
- WHEREAS, the Division of Health Programs has identified a source of funds for FY 2005 through the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of Rural Health Policy CFDA # 93.912 providing up to \$200,000 per year for three years to enhance health care delivery on the Reservation; and
- WHEREAS, the Division of Health Programs, through the N'dee Health Web and in partnership with the Indian Health Service, proposes to develop home-based skilled nursing services over the next three years to specifically address the need for post-hospital medical services such as intravenous antibiotic therapy.
- BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby directs the Director of the Division of Health Programs to pursue funding through 2005 Rural Health Care Services Outreach Grant to be implemented from May 1, 2005 through April 30, 2008.

The foregoing resolution was on <u>SEPTEMBER 9, 2004</u> duly adopted by a vote of <u>EIGHT</u> for and <u>ZERO</u> against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article IV, Section 1 (a), (b), (s), (t), and (u) of the Constitution of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe September 30, 1993, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on November 12, 1993, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).

The Whiteriver Service Unit (WRSU) has long recognized the need for high quality home health services in our area. We are pleased to hear of the interest of the White Mountain Apache Tribe (WMAT) and other members of the *Ndee Health Web* in a project that would establish a tribally managed, certified home health care service for Native Americans living on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation.

The WRSU is the federally designated health care provider for the WMAT people, servicing approximately 1,900 inpatients and 12° °00 outpatients annually at the Whiteriver Indian Hospital and the Cibecue Health Center. Despite our status as the area's pri / care medical center, the IHS is not authorized to operate home health care services. As a result, none exist for the almost 15,000 WMAT members living on the reservation.

The proposed project will provide an essential medical service for the WMAT people and significantly enhance the activities of the Indian Health Service's program at Whiteriver. As a federal agency, our involvement may be restricted by federal regulations and statutes as well as standards imposed by the Joint Commission of Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO), the Center for Medicare Services (CMS), and other pertinent regulatory bodies. Fiscal and personnel resources imposed on our agency may further limit our role in the project.

The Whiteriver Service Unit looks forward to working closely with the tribe on developing this proposal. We anticipate a process of evaluation meetings with key technical experts from the service unit and broader IHS offices to quantify home health needs and assess the hurdles associated with the establishment of home health services. Our staff remains committed to working closely with the tribe to identify action plans needed to address these obstacles and meet the necessary regulatory requirements. While this may be a long process, we welcome the challenge of working with the White Mountain Apache Tribe to address this critical need.

We ask for your full support of this important initiative.
