(Authorizing Publication of Certain Manuscript by Johns Hopkins Personnel)

WHEREAS, the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe in conjunction with Johns Hopkins University has conducted research projects for more than 30 years which aim to raise the level of health of all residents of the Reservation; and

WHEREAS, the Tribal Council supports the continued progress and positive outcomes from the research projects that have attributed to medical science and the development of interventions which seek to decrease or alleviate certain health problems; and

WHEREAS, Johns Hopkins is requesting permission to publish a manuscript entitled: - Efficacy of motavizumab for the prevention of RSV disease among healthy Native American infants; and

where we will be with the manuscript are indicated or referenced in the manuscript, and all information contained in the manuscript is submitted for the purpose of developing strategies that may help reduce the high rate of respiratory illnesses in the White Mountain Apache community and other American Indian communities; and

WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribal Health Board reviewed and approved the above listed manuscript on January 7, 2015; and

WHEREAS, the manuscript, if approved, will be submitted for publication in The Lancet - Infectious Disease Journal; and

WHEREAS, the Tribal Council finds that the publication of the manuscript would be in the best interests of the Tribe and beneficial to other American Indian communities in order to reduce the high rates of RSV and other respiratory illnesses that burden our children.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby approves the submission of the manuscript described herein for publication in the Lancet Infectious Disease Journal.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby requests a copy of the publications should they be accepted for publication.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby directs that in the event that this Resolution conflicts with a prior Resolution or Policy, this Resolution shall supersede and govern over the conflicting subject matter.

Resolution No. 01-2015-04

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby directs that in the event this Resolution directly conflicts with the Tribal Constitution, Tribal Ordinances or Federal Laws, or any material facts concerning the issues presented are later found to be false, this Resolution shall be deemed null and void and have no legal effect.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that the Chairman, or in his absence, the Vice-Chairman, is hereby authorized to execute any and all documents necessary to effectuate the intent of this Resolution.

> The foregoing resolution was on JANUARY 14, 2015 duly adopted by a vote of TEN for, ZERO against, and ONE abstention by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it under the enumerated powers listed in Article IV, Section 1 of the WMAT Constitution, so ratified on September 30, 1993, and federally recognized pursuant to Section 16 of the Indian Reorganization Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
