BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that the Chairman, or in his absence, the Vice-Chairman, is hereby authorized to execute any and all documents necessary to effectuate the intent of this Resolution.

Regular Meeting Minutes March 6, 2019 – 9:00 A.M. Executive Conference Room

I. CALL TO ORDER:

- A. The meeting was called to order at 9:10 A.M. by Chairwoman Gwendena Lee-Gatewood
- B. Prayer was offered by Jerold Altaha

D. Approval of Minutes: Motioned by Jerold Altaha, seconded by Travis Tessay, to approve minutes of Feb 6, 2019 as written. Vote: 10-0-0 Motion passed.

II. REPORTS

A. Attorneys Report:

Enact Ordinance 293 – Health and Safety Code

The Ordinance was posted for ten days in public places in Districts I, II, III, IV for public review and comments. The Council Secretary reported no comments were received.

Motioned by Jerold Altaha, seconded by Vice Chairman Kasey to approve resolution, <u>Enactment of Ord. No. 293, Amending the Health and Safety Code of the WMAT</u> Vote: 10-0-0. Motion passed.

DOC Evacuation: Attorney Douma reported that on February 20, DOC was evacuated from the Detention Center in Ft. Apache due to safety concerns for staff and inmates. The bricks had started to fall off and exposed the beams. There are cracks in the floors and walls and cracks throughout the building. It was determined the building belongs to BIA as it is on their inventory. It is BIA's responsibility to get a structural engineer to assess the building and is responsible for making the repairs. Housing did a safety inspection and found several issues with the building. The Staff were moved to the substation at Hon Dah and Chief Webster was able to provide some space in his office building for a couple of days. The inmates were transferred to the Holbrook Facilities and Apache County Facilities. Changes to the 638 Contract have to be made if the inmates continue to be housed off the reservation. There were discussions about getting a new building for the Department of Corrections rather than doing repairs to the existing building as it would only be a temporary fix. BIA superintendent reported BIA had received a quite bit of funding already for the building just this past week. Money was also received for the roof. They will procure a structural engineer to assess the building.

Third party billing update: Attorney Douma reported Division of Health, Rainbow Treatment Center are doing their-own third party billing. Rainbow Treatment Center will start providing services to Diabetes Center and CBO. EMS has begun doing in house third-party billing. This benefits the tribe by keeping the money here rather than sending the work off the reservation. There are possibilities that RTC may provide 3rd party billing services for other tribal programs. This is information only for the Council and do not need to do a resolution.

It was requested by a Council member to have a workshop for the Council to learn more about third party billing and to better understand the services.

- C. Head Start: Written Report Leola Larzelere, Head Start Director A written report was submitted.
- D. Presentation of Adverse Childhood Experiences. Michelle Martinez
 Emily Gaffney-Nurse Practioner, Bonnie Tenijieth-Patient Advocate
 Ms. Gaffney reported they are involved with Johns Hopkins and ABHS in this project. This is a study addressing how to improve mental and physical health in the communities. There are studies being done on why do things that happened to us as kids affect our health as adults. It's important that we address these things with adults and kids and talk about prevention. Ms. Gaffney stated one of things they are doing at the hospital is focusing on suicide and mental health. They are trying to become a trauma informed hospital. That means educating the entire staff at the hospital. AZ working on ACE informed Care. Recognizing trauma. The first step is awareness and education. Ms. Gaffney explained the initial study was done in California and implementing the practice as a result of that study. There are 26 lessons and available for review by video 1-5 minutes in length if the Council is

interested in viewing them. It can be arranged with the Tribal Council Secretary.

E. Washington D.C. Trip – Informational Update – Chairwoman Gwendena Lee Gatewood
The Chairwoman reported they will look into the infrastructure at Hon Dah for future homes on tax credit and see if they eligible for water and the waste water system. Regarding the new Health Care Facility, because of the government shutdown the planning for the project was delayed but expect it to be completed by July 2019 and submitted for review and approval. They are planning to have funding appropriated and available by October 2020. This process will take some time. The cost is \$400 million for the new hospital at 400,000 sq. ft. She reported they have challenges but are working through it. They are ready to get started on this new hospital with planning phases and they are starting on the design.

- A. Approving 2019 Ceremonial Sunrise Dance Schedule
 - Motioned by Vice Chairman Kasey, seconded by Renaldo Dazen to approve 2019 Sunrise Dance Schedule Resolution as presented. Vote: 8-0-3 Motion passed.

There were much discussions on the locations of the Sunrise Dance Ceremonies. Should restrictions be imposed due to safety concerns and accessibility to the remote areas by emergency vehicles. There were also concerns about camps in forested areas during extreme fire danger periods. The Environmental Department had concerns about fences being cut and Game and Fish having to do the repairs. The camps do not always get torn down and debris left behind. Should the dances only be allowed in the local designated or existing dance grounds and/or personal cornfields. The discussions offered no resolve so the council took action only to approve the scheduling of the sunrise dances as presented by resolution.

Michael Henry reported the resolution had been drafted. He responded "yes" when Attorney asked him if the company had already done the work. The resolution is valid from today forward. Attorney had reviewed the resolution and the company received their film permit. She continued we have never approved anything for this company. The permit does not cover the location and appearances. One council member stated it should have been approved by the Council first and that it was being done backwards. Attorney Douma explained the Materials Release is the issue today. That will allow them to release it to T.V. or other media and to take out the appearance and location release as that has already been done. Gary Alchesay moved to table this item, seconded by Vice Jerome Kasey to get more information. The Chairwoman asked if all were in agreement to table. Councilman Beach was opposed to tabling the matter. The Chairwoman tabled this item due to many unanswered questions.

Jackie Lee read the resolution aloud Approving Adoption of a Social Media/Electronic Media Policy A copy of the proposed Policy "WMAT Website, Social and Traditional Media Policy" was presented to the Council for its review. She explained the process of how the committee formed the policy. A survey was sent out to all employees and a letter was written to all employees for their input. The Committee and Council discussed this matter in depth. There were many concerns expressed. The Tribal Council were not against the Policy but would like to review and discuss the matter further for a better understanding of the policy before approving it. It was agreed that this would be presented at the Supervisors' meeting on Monday as a topic of discussion. It will also be presented at the Council Work Study Session on Friday, March 15.

It ahead of time because they have the funding. Initially they wanted to build at Turkey Creek. Nineteen homes at Turkey Creek, but moving project to Hon Dah. They are planning to do in it five phases. The project location of the homes was moved to Hon Dah because more feasible for water and sewer infrastructure. Dorothy Parker stated the project at Turkey Creek planned in two years.
